## CITY TO IMPLEMENT

### *Sign System*



The City of North Augusta recently completed the design of a comprehensive Public Information Sign System. A cooperative effort of the Departments of Public Works and Economic and Community Development, the system will incorporate the City logo and create a unifying network of City limits signs, directional signs, building and facility identification signs and street name signs. Gateway signs will welcome both residents and visitors at major entrances to the City. The first phase of the new sign system will begin late this spring. New signs will be installed and existing signs replaced as needed over several years.

## CITY RECEIVES

### *Palmetto Grant*

The Southeastern Palm and Exotic Plant Society recently selected the City of North Augusta to receive its \$500 palm grant. The Society awards one grant per year to a member who takes the initiative to plant palms in his or her hometown. Society member and local resident Austin Brown, encouraged by the palmettos being planted on Georgia Avenue, submitted the application on behalf of the City.

The City will use the grant to purchase and plant a cluster of three Sabal Palms, the State Tree of South Carolina, in front of the Municipal Building on East Buena Vista Avenue. The trees will be planted in late April or early May.



# “CLICK IT OR TICKET” *Campaign A Success*

Failure to buckle up contributes to more highway fatalities than any other single traffic safety related behavior. In this country there is an average of one fatality every hour because a driver or a passenger didn't buckle up. South Carolina has the third worst traffic fatality rate in the nation, exceeding the national average by more than thirty percent.

To draw attention to highway fatalities and encourage increased use of seat belts, the South Carolina Department of Public Safety

initiated the “Click It or Ticket” campaign, the largest non-emergency law enforcement mobilization in South Carolina history. The campaign was preceded by a statewide public awareness program and implemented between November 20 and December 3, 2000. Personnel from 248 state and local agencies manned more than 2,000 public safety checkpoints. Motorists found in violation of a seat belt or child restraint law were ticketed. During the period of the campaign, seat belt use increased from 65.2% to 73.9% and fatal accidents decreased by 42% statewide.

Checkpoints in North Augusta reported that an average of 95% of motorists were properly restrained. Prior to the campaign, North Augusta Public Safety officers conducted seat belt use surveys in the City. At that time 79% of motorists surveyed were buckled up. After the “Click It or Ticket” campaign a second series of seat belt use surveys were conducted at the same locations. The results indicated a use rate of 92%, at an increase of 13% over the pre-campaign rate.

In recognition of its efforts and the high number of motorists in compliance with the seat belt law, the City of North Augusta Department of Public Safety received several awards for its dedication and commitment to traffic safety. A special honor was the Department's First Place Award under the Governor's Challenge Awards Program.

## SALT VOLUNTEERS *Recognized*

SALT, “Seniors and Law Enforcement Together”, is comprised of a group of Senior volunteers who regularly donate their time and talent to serve the City in a variety of areas. Founded in February 1993 to assist the Department of Public Safety, SALT volunteers serve as bailiffs in jury selection and courtroom proceedings and provide invaluable service in the Records Division. The scope of the work performed by SALT volunteers has expanded considerably since 1993. Volunteers now regularly manage the reception desk at the Riverview Park Activities Center and assist the Departments of Public Works and Building Standards with critical record keeping tasks.


SALT members work an estimated 5,000 hours a year and provide an invaluable service and cost savings to the City. In recognition of their support, volunteers who work 50 hours in the first year and 48 hours every year thereafter receive a complimentary annual membership in the Activities Center. Additionally, a quarterly luncheon is held and a Volunteer of the Quarter is selected to receive a Certificate of Appreciation and a gift certificate. And at the end of each year a Volunteer of the Year is selected from the four Volunteers of the Quarter.

Lawanda Blythe, a North Augusta resident since 1951 and a SALT member since the program was initiated, was recently recognized as the North Augusta SALT Volunteer for the Year 2000. Mrs. Blythe currently volunteers at the Activities Center and also works with

# DOWNTOWN *Update*

Work continues to proceed on North Augusta's Downtown Streetscape Project. The majority of planned sidewalk, curbing, driveway and gutter reconstruction work from the Georgia Avenue Bridge through the 400 block of Georgia Avenue is complete.

Decorative brick pavers have been installed along the edges and in designated sections of the sidewalk along the 300 and 400 blocks. Sidewalk construction is currently underway in the 500 block, between Pine Grove and Spring Grove Avenues. The sidewalk work will continue through the 600 block (First Baptist and Grace United Methodist Churches) to the intersection of Georgia and Jackson Avenues. Brick pavers will also be installed in these blocks after the concrete sidewalk work is complete.

Landscaping and irrigation is complete from the Georgia Avenue Bridge to the intersection of Georgia and Buena Vista Avenues and will continue into the 400, 500 and 600 blocks. The amount of landscaping in these three blocks will vary because of the width of Georgia Avenue and on-street parking. It will

generally consist of turf, ground cover, low-growing shrubs and some shade trees between the sidewalk and the roadway.



In preparation for underground wiring several new decorative street light poles have been installed on Georgia Avenue. Installation of the remainder of the light poles will continue, however, the installation of some poles will be delayed until overhead wiring is removed. New traffic signals at the intersections of Buena Vista Avenue and Spring Grove Avenue will be installed later this month.


In June the final roadway pavement on Georgia Avenue will be installed and pedestrian crosswalks will be stamped with StreetPrint, a process that replicates the appearance of brick pavers. According to Tom Zeaser, Director of Engineering and Public Works, streetscape construction is on schedule and should be complete by the end of July.

## WATERWORKS PARK *Improved*




Work was recently completed on a major addition to Waterworks Park, a covered picnic pavilion. The pavilion features a large charcoal grill and four large picnic tables, two of which are handicap accessible. Installation of the pavilion was initiated and substantially funded by the North Augusta Sertoma Club. A \$30,000 Sertoma donation was used to purchase the pre-manufactured structure. The City supplemented the Sertoma donation with approximately \$10,000 for site work and erection of the structure. The pavilion is located on the Waterworks extension of the Greenway (which parallels Riverside Boulevard from the Georgia Avenue Tunnel to the Municipal Building) and is available at any time during daylight hours on a first come, first served basis. The pavilion may be reserved for an eight-hour period with the payment of a \$50 reservation fee by calling the Department of Parks, Recreation and Leisure Services at 441-4300.


The next phase of Waterworks Park, scheduled to begin later this year, will include the renovation of the old Waterworks Pump House to provide restrooms and the creation of a water garden in the old brick water basin. Planned future enhancements to Waterworks Park, to be funded with the recently approved Capital Projects Sales Tax, include improvements to Maude Edenfield Creek with the construction of a series of dams and shallow ponds. The dams will be constructed to create a waterfall effect at the downstream end of each pond and will improve stormwater detention from East Buena Vista Avenue runoff. 

Visitors to the City's website, [www.northaugusta.net](http://www.northaugusta.net), can now access a zoning and property information map of the City in addition to the City's Zoning and Development Standards Ordinance. The map allows the viewer to access detailed parcel information as recorded and maintained by Aiken County. Information available includes zoning, parcel number, parcel size, appraised value, legal description, the property owner's name and address and more. For some parcels the information may not be current or entirely complete. The City will update the database at least annually using the most recent Aiken County information available. The link to the map is located below the link to the Zoning Ordinance on the [www.northaugusta.net](http://www.northaugusta.net) home page. The Zoning and Development Standards Ordinance details the rules and regulations that guide the use of land and buildings in the City. Together, the map and the ordinance should be able to answer zoning questions for anyone with Internet access.

# 2000 DRINKING WATER *Quality Report*

*The City of North Augusta is pleased to present its 2000 Drinking Water Quality Report. This report is an annual requirement of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and is designed to inform you about the quality water and services delivered to you every day. Our constant goal is to provide a safe and dependable supply of drinking water. We are committed to ensuring quality water and want to inform you of the efforts we make to continually improve water treatment processes.*

The Savannah River is the source of North Augusta's drinking water. Raw water is pumped to the treatment plant where conventional treatment processes are used to produce high quality drinking water. As required by Federal and State laws, the City of North Augusta routinely monitors for more than 80 contaminants in your drinking water. Based on these test results, we are pleased to report that **North Augusta's drinking water is safe and meets all Federal and State requirements.**

All sources of drinking water are subject to potential contamination by substances that are naturally occurring or man-made. These substances can be microbes, inorganic or organic chemicals and radioactive substances. All drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that the water poses a health risk. Source Water Assessment Plans (SWAP) are scheduled to be completed for all public water systems in South Carolina by May 2003. SWAP, among other things, identify potential sources of contamination to drinking water supplies. The South Carolina Department of Health and Environmental Control is in the process of completing these plans. When the plan for this water system is complete, you will be advised how to obtain a copy of it.

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. More information about contaminants, potential health effects, and lessening risk of infection by microbiological contaminants can be obtained by calling the EPA's Safe Drinking Water Hotline at 800-426-4791.

The following tables show the laboratory results for samples collected during the 1999-2000 calendar year. **Only those contaminants that were detected are shown.** A complete list of contaminants we test for is available upon request.

In the tables you will find many terms and abbreviations you might not be familiar with. To help you better understand these terms we've provided the following definitions:

**Parts per million (ppm) or Milligrams per liter (mg/l)** - one part per million corresponds to one minute in two years or a single penny in \$10,000.

**Parts per billion (ppb) or Micrograms per liter** - one part per billion corresponds to one minute in 2,000 years, or a single penny in \$10,000,000.

**Nephelometric Turbidity Unit (NTU)** - nephelometric turbidity unit is a measure of the clarity of water. Turbidity in excess of 5 NTU is just noticeable to the average person.

**Action Level (AL)** - the concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.

**Maximum Contaminant Level** - The "Maximum Allowed" (MCL) is the highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

**Maximum Contaminant Level Goal** - The "Goal"(MCLG) is the level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety. MCL's are set at very stringent levels. To understand the possible health effects described for many regulated constituents, a person would have to drink 2 liters of water every day at the MCL level for a lifetime to have a one-in-a-million chance of having the described health effect.

### Bacteriological Analysis

Coliforms are bacteria that are naturally present in the environment and are used as an indicator that other, potentially harmful bacteria may be present. Samples are collected from 40 representative sites throughout the water distribution system monthly and analyzed for total coliform bacteria. The EPA requires that at least **95%** of the samples test negative. We achieved **100%** compliance as no coliform bacteria were detected in any of the samples analyzed in 2000.

### Turbidity Measurements

Turbidity is the measure of the cloudiness of water. We measure it because it is a good indicator of both water quality and the effectiveness of our filtration system. Water treatment plant personnel analyzed more than 3,100 post-filtration samples for turbidity level in 2000. We achieved **100%** compliance as none of the samples exceeded the MCL of 0.50 NTU.

### TTHM [Total Trihalomethanes]

Trihalomethanes are a group of compounds formed when chlorine reacts with naturally-occurring organic materials present in the source water. The MCL established by EPA for TTHM is **100 ppb** as a running annual average of all samples collected. Samples are collected quarterly from 4 representative sites within the water distribution system.

# HOLIDAY Sanitation Schedule

North Augusta provides once-a-week curbside collection of residential recyclable material, yard waste, garbage and trash.
