# PARKS & RECPEATION Master Plan

Last month, after almost a year of work, the final draft of the North Augusta Parks and Recreation Master Plan was presented to the City Council. Prepared by the planning and engineering firm, Woolpert, LLC, the plan recommends priorities for North Augusta parks, recreation facilities and recreation programs through the year 2015. The recommendations are based on extensive community input, an evaluation of current programs and facilities, and a comparison of North Augusta's facilities and programs with national and state standards. The Master Plan is a flexible document designed to provide a framework the City Council can use to better maintain and enhance the city's parks and recreation system and meet the growing needs of the community.

The plan recommends that a number of new parks be developed in the coming years. A regional park of approximately 200 acres, a district park of about 60 acres, four community parks of 10 acres, and six neighborhood parks of two to five acres are on the list. Locations for new parks have not yet been identified. However, the plan recommends that parks be located so that they are accessible to all parts of the city. A regional park is a major facility and would serve a population of approximately 45,000, an area well beyond the city limits. A district park is similar in size and amenities as Riverview Park. Summerfield Park is a good example of a community park and the new Walnut Lane Park is a neighborhood park.

Other recommended park facilities are more specialized. The proposed riverfront park to provide public access to the river is strongly recommended. Access points for canoes and kayaks should be included. A cultural and performing arts facility, a conference center in the riverfront development, and a competitive level swimming facility are included in the plan. Passive parks including a town square (based on the original 1891 plan for North Augusta), an open space area on the corner of Georgia Avenue and Martintown Road, new sections of the Greeneway and more Greeneway connectors are also strongly encouraged.

The Parks and Recreation Master Plan also suggests that existing parks and facilities be improved in a number of ways. Recommended park improvements include new play equipment, more picnic shelters, better signage and lighting, more parking, and more trails and sidewalks for better access. The Community Center and Activities Center should be upgraded and expanded. Ultimately the Activities Center could include four additional basketball courts. Detailed proposals for the improvement of Riverview Park include a new, larger playground with an interactive water feature, indoor and outdoor pools, state of the art baseball and softball complexes, a new tennis complex, and other modifications.

Implementation of the Master Plan, budgeted at approximately \$57 million, will occur in several phases. Funding for new parks and facilities and for renovations to existing facilities will be generated through a variety of sources including city and county sales tax revenues, park and recreation fees, state and federal grants, corporate sponsorships, and public/private partnerships. The plan also recommends cost savings through cooperation with the Aiken County Public Schools and possibly Aiken County for the joint use and maintenance of existing facilities.

# CODE COMPLIANCE

Many North Augusta citizens contact the city with questions about regulations that affect the use of private property and with concerns about whether certain properties comply with these regulations. This article briefly describes a few of the most common complaints, violations and the rules that apply to each.

### **Property Maintenance**

Last year more than one hundred citizens contacted the city's Zoning and Code Compliance Office with concerns or complaints about the maintenance of residential property. The North Augusta Municipal Code regulates some property maintenance issues. Under certain conditions overgrown yards and residential vegetation, any accumulation of litter, trash or debris and the storage of inoperable or unregistered vehicles are code violations.

### **Vehicle and Equipment Storage**

The Code also regulates the parking and storage of recreational vehicles and equipment, large trucks, trailers and other major transportation equipment. Recreational vehicles and equipment may be parked anywhere on residential premises, streets or other public right-of-way for a maximum of five days in any one thirty-day period. For periods of more than five days, recreational vehicles and equipment must be stored in a carport, enclosed building or behind the building line of the primary building closest to the street. Large transport trucks and similar heavy transportation equipment may not be parked on a public right-of-way for any period longer than twenty-four hours or for any period in the front yard of any residentially zoned lot.

### **Temporary Signs**

Many questions relate to the use of temporary signs. Many temporary signs are permitted on private residential property including those that advertise yard sales, real estate for sale or rent, special events and political candidates. Permits are not required for most temporary signs and the maximum allowable size of a temporary sign in a residential area varies. Six square feet is generally the maximum. For safety reasons, signs located on private property must not block driver visibility along a road or at an intersection.

Temporary signs may not be posted on any public property or within any public right-of-way (sidewalk, street, street median, park, etc.). It is also unlawful to paste, paint, tack or place any handbill, circular, picture or other advertising material on any bridge, lamppost, fence, corner post or utility pole. Signs posted in the right-of-way and on utility poles and lampposts clutter the appearance of a roadway and pose potential hazards by distracting motorists.

The city's code compliance inspector regularly removes signs that are improperly posted on public property and within public rights-of-way. Signs found to be in violation and creating a potential hazard, whether on public or private property, may be removed immediately and without notification.

### STORMWATER MANAGER — Hivod

The city of North Augusta recently welcomed David Caddell as the city's first official Stormwater Manager. David earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Wildlife Biology from Clemson University.

For the past seven years he has been employed by the South Carolina Department of Health and Environmental Control, (SCDHEC), most recently as Manager of Wastewater and Stormwater programs.



As North Augusta's Stormwater
Manager, David is responsible for
ensuring the city's compliance with regulations enforced
by the US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and
SCDHEC under the Clean Water Act. The regulations
require states and local governments to manage stormwater to prevent pollution. Every municipality is require
d to develop and implement a Stormwater Management
Program that addresses six specific areas.

- Public Education and Outreach
- Public Involvement and Participation
- Elimination of Illicit Discharges
- Construction Site Stormwater Runoff Management
- Post-Construction Site Stormwater Runoff Management
- Pollution Prevention and Good Housekeeping

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In an effort to increase public awareness of stormwater pollution prevention, the city's Stormwater Management Department has begun a program of installing markers on storm drainage inlets. The markers are brightly colored with a fish or frog logo and the mes-

sage "No Dumping, Drains To River." The message advises citizens NOT to dump waste into storm drains.

Careless dumping of used oil, antifreeze, household chemicals, and other waste down storm drains has become a common pollution problem. Often people do not realize that enormous amounts of pollution come from the accumulation of individual citizen actions, not just from industry. They do not understand that storm drains connect directly to local

streams, lakes, beaches or ground water aquifers. Most people will protect these waterways because they value clean water for drinking, recreation, and for fish and wildlife habitat.

Public education and outreach is a critical part of the city's Stormwater Management Program as required by the US Environmental Protection Agency. As the program grows the city hopes to provide opportunities for individual volunteers and civic groups to become involved and to help out by applying the curb markers in needed locations.

## HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE COLLECTION DAY

To further reduce the improper disposal of pollutants, the city will host a "Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day" on July 26. The event will be held in the parking lot of Crossroads Market Shopping Center (the Kroger grocery store) on Martintown Road from 9:00 a.m. until 2:00 p.m. A hazardous waste handler will be on site to accept potential pollutants including paint, motor oil, solvents, pesticides, cleaners and other chemical solutions. There will be a limited capacity for the amount of waste received, so residents should come early. The collection event is intended for North Augusta residents only. Waste from businesses or other large generators of hazardous waste will not be accepted. For more information call Stormwater Manager David Caddell at 441-4246.

### EXTREME —Lease—



On May 19 the North Augusta City Council approved the construction of a skate park. Supporters of a skateboarding facility, including several members of the City Council, have advocated the project for several years. Under the terms of a lease agreement between the city and the Hammond Hills Suburban Club, the city will make improvements to an unused tennis court site, owned by the Club, for use as the skate park. The new park will be located adjacent to the Hammond Hills swimming pool on Cypress Drive near the Greeneway.

When complete the park will be open to skateboarders, rollerbladers and BMX cyclists of all ages. Admission to the park will require both a nominal annual membership fee and a fee for each session. In addition to access to the park, the fees will provide members with a supplemental insurance policy. The park will be gated and supervised at all times and all

skaters and cyclists will be required to wear protective equipment.

Park construction is scheduled to begin in early July and be complete in August. Available funds will provide for new pavement where needed, pavement sealant and fencing. Additional funding through grants and sponsorships will be necessary to add ramps and complete the project. A committee of city employees, youth skaters and ramp building professionals will evaluate all of the ramps and the park facility for safety during construction and periodically after the park is open.
