CAPITAL PROJECTS SALES TAX

The last issue of *North Augusta Forward* summarized major park improvements and street reconstruction work being completed with the first round of the Aiken County Capital Projects Sales Tax. Operational improvements to the city's material recovery facility were also described. In this issue projects that are planned or will soon be under construction are explained.

DRAINAGE IMPROVEMENTS

One of the largest projects funded by the Capital Projects Sales Tax is the installation of a regional drainage system on East Buena Vista Avenue and Riverside Boulevard to relieve periodic flooding. The flooding problem was especially bad in 2003 because of the large amounts of rainfall. City crews reconstructed the shoulders on East Buena Vista Avenue several times after heavy rains. The project is currently under design and will include the widening of East Buena Vista Avenue between Brookside Drive and Atomic Road. A landscaped median and turn lanes will be installed at the intersections. New curb and gutter will also be installed. A related project to be funded by the South Carolina Department of Transportation in 2006 will widen and beautify Buena Vista Avenue from Atomic Road to East Martintown Road. The drainage improvements will carry storm water collected from Martintown Road and East Buena Vista Avenue to the creek adjacent to Riverside Boulevard.

The Riverside Boulevard creek runs through Waterworks Park between East Buena Vista Avenue and the River Club Golf Course. Waterworks Park is the location of the Sertoma funded picnic pavilion. The creek collects runoff from several areas. In addition to storm water that originates on East Martintown Road, water from natural springs behind the Community Center is collected in an open channel that flows through Edenfield Park and is then piped under East Buena Vista Avenue to the creek. Edenfield Park has also flooded on several occasions. Improvements to the creek in Waterworks Park will create a series of ponds and natural waterfalls to reduce erosion, trap silt, and improve water quality while providing a park amenity.

Construction on the East Buena Vista Avenue drainage improvements and widening project is planned to begin in the third quarter of 2004. \$1.5 million of the project cost is funded with proceeds from the Capital Projects Sales Tax.

STREET RESURFACING

In approving the Capital Projects Sales Tax referendum three years ago, city voters also approved resurfacing 17 miles of city streets. Many neighborhoods in the city have already seen the results of the resurfacing program. Approximately 6.5 miles of streets were resurfaced in 2002 and 2003. In 2004 approximately 10.5 miles of streets are scheduled for resurfacing.

SIDEWALK CONSTRUCTION

Most of the neighborhoods developed in North Augusta over the last fifty years did not include sidewalks. To improve pedestrian safety and to make the city's neighborhoods more walkable, the City Council included a sidewalk construction program for funding with the Capital Projects Sales Tax. A total of approximately 7.5 miles of sidewalks will be constructed in priority areas – adjacent to schools, parks and public facilities and on neighborhood streets with high traffic volumes.

Martintown Road - Socastee Drive

Skyview Drive - Weston Street

Five miles of sidewalks on neighborhood streets will be constructed in 2004. Additionally, the sidewalk system in Riverview Park will be expanded and a sidewalk on Five Notch Road will be constructed to provide access to the new Mossy Creek

Elementary School. The Five Notch Road sidewalk will be installed at the time the school is built. The following local streets are scheduled to receive sidewalks in 2004:

DOWNTOWN STREETSCAPE, PHASE 2

Several years ago the city completed substantial improvements to Georgia Avenue, the first phase of the Downtown Streetscape project. Later this year Phase 2 will commence. The section of West Avenue between Jackson and Clifton Avenues will be improved with wider sidewalks, pavement treatment at the crosswalks, street trees, and relocated utility lines. Spring Grove, Pine Grove, and Buena Vista Avenues between Georgia and West Avenues will be improved in the project. An additional half block segment of Spring Grove Avenue west of West Avenue will also be streetscaped.

The project, estimated at a total cost of \$1.8 million, has been planned by the city since 1998. Implementing a streetscape design that would improve pedestrian safety and provide additional onstreet parking required that the downtown street segments planned for improvement be removed from the state highway system. After a series of discussions and with the cooperation of SCDOT personnel, the city and SCDOT "swapped" the downtown streets for the city-owned portion of Bergen Road.

Funding for the second phase of streetscape work will be provided in part by the Capital Projects Sales Tax (\$600,000). SCE&G, through its Non Standard Service Fund agreement with the city, will provide \$138,000. Federal Transportation Enhancement Funds distributed through SCDOT will contribute \$620,000. And city funds, appropriated in the Riverfront/Central Core Redevelopment Fund, will make up the \$442,000 balance.

CAPITAL BROJECTS SALES TAX Second Kound

When initially enacted in November 2000, the total amount of countywide sales tax revenues projected to be collected was expected to take seven years. Actual revenues, however, exceeded the estimates. The county now projects that the \$54.7 million total will be collected in just over five years. Because the first round of sales tax funded projects have been so well received by citizens, Aiken County, and the cities within the county including North Augusta, are proposing that the one-cent tax be continued. Aiken County citizens will have the opportunity to vote on the continuation of the one-cent tax for another seven years. A referendum on the extension is scheduled for the 2004 general election on November 9.

If approved the continuation of the sales tax will generate an estimated \$18.3 million for additional improvement projects in North Augusta. The City Council has identified a list of projects to recommend for inclusion on the referendum ballot and has appointed Dr. John F. Bigger, Jr. to represent North Augusta on the Aiken County Capital Projects Sales Tax Commission, the body that recommends the final list of projects to the County Council. The projects approved by the City Council for submission to the Sales Tax Commission are:




KIDS EARTH DAY


