

## Celtis Occidentalis Common Hackberry



Commonly known as the sugarberry or false elm, the hackberry is a member of the elm (*Ulmaceae*) family. The genus *Celtis* comes from the Latin name of the African lotus tree in reference to its sweet fruit while the specific epithet *occidentalis* means western or of the western hemisphere, appropriately named by Carl Linnaeus (a Swedish botanist).

Category: Deciduous tree

Hardiness: Zone 3-9

Foliage: Light to medium green

Bark: Gray bark covered with corky warts and ridges

Shape: In youth weekly pyramidal; old age broad

crown with ascending branches

Mature Size: 40-60ft tall by 40-60ft wide

**Growth Rate:** Moderate to Fast

Shade: Full Sun,

Adaptability: Very adaptable to floodplains, open

fields, along roadsides and in fencerows

Native Habitat: Quebec to Manitoba, south to

Georgia & Oklahoma

Uses: lawn tree or street tree
