

Quercus virginiana Southern Laurel Oak



Category: Evergreen to semi-evergreen, broadleaf

large tree

Hardiness: Zone 7b-10b

Foliage: dark green leaf with olive green leaf underside; inner foliage turns yellow brown and sheds throughout the winter & at time of new growth in the spring

Bark: Smooth; tannish gray, matures to dark gray with thick, rough, deep fissures and ridges

Shape: Sprawling wide crown; usually possess many curved trunks and branches

Mature Size: 60-80ft tall 60-120ft wide

Growth Rate: Slow to moderate

Shade: Part shade to Full Sun

Adaptability: Good choice for streets and medians; adaptable to many soil types, drought, needs large, well-drained growing area for root system

Native Habitat: Coastal plains of Eastern & Southern United States to east Texas.

Uses: Large parking lot islands, buffer strips, around parking lots, shade tree and residential street tree
