North Augusta Awarded Hazard Tree Removal Grant by the SC Forestry **Commission (SCFC) and the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA)**

In January, a \$20,000 grant was awarded to North Augusta to remove hazard trees from city right of ways. The SCFC Community Forest Health Enrichment Assistance grant program established to assist South Carolina cities and towns with hazard tree removal and replacement. According to USDA, a "hazard tree" is a tree with structural defects likely to cause failure of all or part of the tree, which could
