PREPARING FOR **THE 2000** CENSUS

The City of North Augusta, like a number of local governments in South Carolina, is assisting Equal Housing Opportunity the US Bureau of the Census to prepare for the upcoming Year 2000 Census. The City is identifying every housing unit in the City to ensure that North Augusta's population is accurately counted.

In 1990 the census results were widely challenged because many cities and counties believed they were undercounted. An accurate count of the local population is important to North Augusta because census figures determine our representation in Congress and the State Legislature. Most federal programs use Census Bureau population data to distribute grant funds. Additionally, the significance of census data to growing communities has expanded in recent years because the information is increasingly used by business and industrial executives to make location, expansion and investment decisions.

The Department of Economic & Community Development recently completed a review and update of the Census Bureau address list and location maps for a large portion of North Augusta. The additions were numerous because of the growth the City has experienced since 1990. Additional address and map reviews will be completed in 1999. You will hear more about the City's efforts and the need for a "full count" prior to the official Census Survey in February 2000.




APRIL IS NATIONAL FAIR **HOUSING MONTH**

1998 BROUGHT STRONG **CONSTRUCTION GROWTH IN NA**

According to figures recently tabulated by the Department of Building Standards, North Augusta experienced strong growth in construction activity in 1998. The value of all residential and commercial construction in North Augusta reached an all-time high in 1998 of \$36,762,725, an increase of 80% over 1997. This figure includes 103 permits issued for single family detached dwellings, a 14% increase over last year's record of 90 permits. Also significant is the total value of repairs, renovations and additions which increased more than five-fold from \$1,946,950 in 1997 to \$9,959,928 in 1998.

FIRE HYDRANT TESTING **SCHEDULED**

Public Utilities is currently testing water system flows and pressures throughout the area. The tests are conducted annually to measure pressure and flow producing capacities at locations within the water distribution system. The goal is to determine how much water is available for fighting fires and to assess the general condition of the water distribution system. 

NEW TANKER ARRIVES

The Fire Division of the Department of Public Safety has purchased a new 1999 Freightliner FL-80 Pumper/Tanker to replace its aging 1966 tanker. The new \$119,000 fire truck arrived in December and has a 1,600 gallon water storage tank, more than twice as large as the Department's other trucks. It has a 500 gallon per minute pump and is equipped with a 1,500 gallon collapsible tank which can be set up at a fire scene to store additional water. Water storage capacity is very important in areas, mostly outside the City limits, where fire hydrants do not exist or are too far away to be used. The 1966 1,000 gallon tanker will be assigned to the Department of Public Works and used for street and storm drain maintenance.

STREETSCAPE PROGRESS UPDATE

Downtown business owners, property owners and North Augusta citizens reviewed detailed plans for Phase I of the Downtown Streetscape Project, Georgia Avenue from the Greeneway Tunnel to Jackson Avenue, on January 25 in the North Augusta Community Center. Citizens who participated in the public review session commented extensively on the details of the design. The input received was incorporated into the plans by the City's design engineer, Cranston, Robertson & Whitehurst, PA, prior to the City Council's final review and authorization to proceed with construction.

Georgia Ave Budgeted at \$1.6 million, the project will significantly improve the appearance of the downtown area, calm traffic and make Georgia Avenue more "pedestrian friendly." Amenities include new curbs and sidewalks, roadway resurfacing, landscaping, paver block crosswalks, new streetlights, traffic signals, benches and trash receptacles.

Construction on Phase I is scheduled to begin in May and be completed within twelve months. The City will serve as the general contractor and work will be divided between City crews and sub-contractors. DOWNTOWN MOTEL PURCHASED

On December 7, 1998, the North Augusta City Council unanimously approved the purchase of the former Downtown Motel property. The 0.62 acre site is located on the southwest corner of Bluff and Georgia Avenues in the Downtown Redevelopment District. The \$86,000 purchase price was financed through the Downtown/Riverfront Redevelopment Fund. The purchase coincides with the planned streetscape improvements on Georgia Avenue and will be used in the future to leverage the redevelopment of this section of the community.

CITY TACKLES Y2K PROBLEM

Year 2000 (Y2K) computer issues are complex. In the past many computer chips and software programs were date coded using only the last two digits of the year. Accordingly, the year 2000 may be interpreted as the year 1900. Left unresolved, this interpretation could cause problems or a complete shutdown of equipment on January 1, 2000.

To prevent potential Y2K problems, a committee of key City personnel was formed in June 1998 to analyze the impact of Y2K on City services and to plan the steps necessary to become Y2K compliant. To date, a complete inventory of potential problem areas has been completed and software vendors have been surveyed to determine the Y2K compliance of programs used by the City. Later this month, installation of Y2K compliant hardware and software will begin at an estimated cost of \$100,000. In the second quarter of this year, an independent compliance audit will be conducted. The schedule provides for the City to be fully Y2K compliant by July 31, 1999.



PUBLIC SAFETY OFFICERS RECEIVE SPECIALIZED TRAINING

North Augusta's Public Safety Officers are often the first emergency personnel to arrive at the scene of an accident or medical emergency. The Officers are all well trained in basic First Aid and CPR. In many situations, however, victims require more than basic First Aid prior to the arrival of an ambulance.

With assistance from Aiken County's Division of Emergency Medical Services, the Department of Public Safety is implementing a First Responder Program. The program, which began January 1, 1999, provides each Officer with 40 hours of advanced emergency medical training and the specialized equipment necessary to provide the additional assistance.

Each North Augusta patrol car will be equipped with an advanced life support kit including an Automatic External Defibrillator (AED), an emergency jump (ventilator) bag, portable oxygen, stethoscope, cervical collars, obstetrical kits, airways and emergency medical supplies.

LION'S FIELD RENOVATIONS UNDERWAY

The renovation of Lion's Field received a high priority from the City Council for funding and construction in 1999 and preparation work on the project has already begun. Budgeted at approximately \$900,000, renovation of the City's primary football facility will include an improved playing field, lighting, fencing, rest rooms, concession stands and paved parking. The project is on a fast track and is scheduled for City Council review in February. Construction is expected to begin in March. The City Department of Engineering and Public Works will serve as the general contractor for the project. The renovation will be completed in time for the beginning of the 1999 football season in September.

OPERATIONS CENTER COMPLETE

The Departments of Public Works and Public Utilities moved in to the City's new Operations Center in January. The Operations Center, located adjacent to the City's Material Recovery Facility on Clay Pit Road, houses 33 Public Works and 22 Public Utilities employees. It includes offices, vehicle and equipment storage space, a parts and equipment warehouse and a modern maintenance garage. The old City Operations Facility on East Buena Vista Avenue and Riverside Boulevard will be torn down. The grounds at both the new Operations Center and the old facility will be landscaped this spring.

ADOPT A PET

In recent years the number of stray or abandoned pets picked up and impounded by the City has decreased slightly. In the same period the number of animals claimed or adopted has increased. The figures are encouraging, but there are still many pets not claimed that need good homes. Anyone interested in adopting a pet can contact the Animal Control Division of the Public Works Department at 441-4237.





DID YOU KNOW? ANIMAL CONTROL

City regulations provide guidelines on the type and number of pets that can be kept in residential areas. For example, livestock (cows, sheep, chickens, hogs, etc.) may not be kept. A family may include up to three dogs or cats older than four months. Litters of puppies or kittens younger than four months may be kept until they can be placed in a new home. However,

pet owners are encouraged to neuter both male and female pets to avoid unanticipated additions to the household.

Pet owners are also required to keep their pets in a fenced yard or on a leash when outdoors. An identification tag and proof of inoculation against rabies should be securely fastened to the animal's collar or harness. A pet allowed to run at large is at risk of being hit by a car or causing a traffic accident. Pets on the loose can sometimes be a nuisance to neighbors and can pose health risks for humans and other pets. The Animal Control Division of the Department of Public Works patrols the City daily to pick up stray and lost animals. Protect your pet by keeping it in a fenced yard or on a leash.
